The Cottonwood Trail also forms an important part of the city's evolving trail network, The Daniel Morgan Trail System (or "The Dan" for short), with more trails and connections planned and underway throughout the community. An excellent spot for recreation, picnicking, and exercise for the whole family, the Cottonwood Trail has a little something for everyone.

A natural-surface trail that runs through the gorgeous Edwin M. Griffin Preserve just outside the center of Spartanburg, the Cottonwood Trail offers a lovely path into the wooded landscape surrounding Lawson's Fork Creek. Signs along the trail provide information about the native trees and foliage - with many examples of the eponymous Cottonwood tree scattered throughout the preserve - and the trail is a hotbed of activity for local wildlife such as wild turkeys and foxes. Chiefly used as a running path or as a means of leisurely hiking through the woods, the trail also provides a convenient connection across residential areas on the outskirts of the city. A variety of shorter spur trails run throughout the preserve, giving you the opportunity to explore more of the natural environment.
