

Bicentennial Greenway North Carolina



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Overview

The Bicentennial Greenway is a 14.5-mile paved pathway connecting the City of Greensboro to the City of High Point, NC. The trail, which is a joint effort of the two cities and Guilford County, exists in multiple as yet unconnected segments.

About the Route

The trail, a combination of off-road asphalt, concrete, and gravel paths, and sidewalks, weaves through residential neighborhoods, mixed forests of hardwoods and pine, parks and natural areas. It connects to amenities including shopping areas and schools. It's open to non-motorized usage, and birding is an exciting activity on the

trail, particularly around the Piedmont Environmental Center at the trail's southern end. The paved portions of the trail may be accessible for those using mobility devices and those interested in inline skating.

The northern segment lies entirely in Greensboro, stretching from Lake Brandt Rd & Old Battleground Rd by the <u>Atlantic & Yadkin Greenway</u> to Fox Chase Road. Follow Fox Chase Road to the Fleming Terrace Road roundabout, where the trail picks back up. The trail meanders south with woods on either side for a majority of the route. There are a few road crossings and the trail passes Leonard Recreation Center, where there are restrooms and parking.

There is a very short gap between the intersection of Nora Rd & Friendly Ave and where Nora Road curves east. Use the quiet neighborhood Nora Road, but proceed with appropriate caution. Continuing south, the greenway runs along several streets and passes stores, residences, businesses, and schools. The southern end of this section is at the intersection of Market St & Swing Rd. There are plans to construct sidewalks on Swing Street to bridge the gap, but trail users will still be required to share the road with vehicles along Burnt Poplar.

The trail picks back up a short distance south-west, at Burnt Poplar Road and continues south as it parallels the East Fork Deep River and the western edge of the High Point Lake. There is a short on-road section along Sunnyvale Drive. Just before the southern end on Penny Road, right on High Point Lake, the trail connects to the High Point Greenway.

Connections

At its northern terminus, the trail links up with the <u>Atlantic & Yadkin Greenway</u>.

Just northern of the trail's southern end on Penny Road, it connects to the <u>High Point Greenway</u>.

Parking & Trail Access

The Bicentennial Greenway runs between the intersection of Lake Brandt Rd & Old Battleground Rd by Atlantic & Yadkin Greenway (Greensboro) and Penny Rd on High Point Lake (High Point) with a few gaps.

Parking is available at numerous points along the trail, including:

- Kernodle Middle School (3600 Drawbridge Pkwy, Greensboro)
- Leonard Recreation Center (6324 Ballinger Rd, Greensboro)
- Trailhead at Wagon Place near Western Guilford High School (409 Friendway Rd, Greensboro)
- Jamestown Park (E Fork Rd, Jamestown)
- Piedmont Environmental Center (1220 Penny Rd, High Point)
